Student absences

In New Zealand, learners are expected to attend school every day school is open. The Ministry of Education has established targets for school attendance and they have divided attendance rates into four categories. The 2024 target for schools is to have at least 70% of their students attending 90%+ of the time. Tapanui School currently has 63.4% of students attending 90%+ of the time for the year to date. We understand that this term has seen many children get numerous illnesses and we appreciate your support in keeping them home over these times so things have less chance of spreading. I did just want to draw your attention to the time that children miss for other reasons eg holidays, shopping days etc. The little chart at the bottom of this page might help to see the amount of school learning that can be missed if regular absence becomes an issue for your child. The following excerpt comes out of our school procedures...

"If there is a justified reason for absence (e.g. due to illness, a funeral or tangihanga, or other approved reason at the discretion of the school), the principal may allow a student to be absent from school for up to five days (Education and Training Act 2020, s 45). In the case of planned absences, requests must be made to the principal at least one week before the planned event. The principal has discretion to approve or deny requests, based on criteria including:

- the benefit to education for the student (including qualifications and experience of course providers as relevant)
- the length of time away from regular school programmes that the activity will require."

This isn't about wanting to be heavy handed...it's simply an act of courtesy to the school as we seek to provide the best learning for your child that we can, but it's also a requirement from the Ministry of Education.

Thanks to everyone who made the Mauri Ora Matariki event. I am feeling super proud of our tamariki.



On Monday, Tui Class did some science with a visitor named Mrs Burke. The experiment was making rockets with plastic bottles. We used baking soda and vinegar and when these are mixed together it makes a big chemical gas reaction. Of course, we could not mix them immediately because of the quick reaction so we had to wrap the baking soda in a thin paper towel and tie it up with string. Then we put 200mls of vinegar in the bottle. Finally we lowered the baking soda into the bottle keeping a little bit of string on the outside. Then it was time to put the rubber bung in (I got Mrs Burke to do mine). Now it was time for take off so I turned it upside down and shook it a few times and in a few seconds it was off. Mine flew off to the side and covered everyone in vinegar!

ROCKET SCIENCE IN TUI CLASS

On Monday the 24 of June, Mrs Burke came in from BMC to do a science experiment with Tui

class to make a rocket. We used a plastic bottle, string, vinegar, baking soda and a very thin paper towel. We first put the baking soda onto a paper towel then rolled it up like a

sausage and tied each end with the string. We went down to the courts and we put 200 ml of vinegar into a plastic bottle. We lowered the baking soda sausage into the bottle, held the

string with our finger so the baking soda wouldn't touch the vinegar then we put a cork in as a stopper. The string had to be outside the bottle. We shook the bottle for eight seconds so the chemicals would react with each other. We put it into the rocket launcher that was made out of a cone and an ice cream pottle. It launched off into the bright blue sky. Bella J



On Monday the 24th, Mrs Burke came to Tapanui school and worked on a science experiment with the Tui class. We made rockets! The main ingredients were vinegar and baking soda. The chemical reaction between the baking soda and the vinegar made a gas which caused the pressure inside the bottle to build up, causing the bottle to explode.

How to make one yourself.

First you get a paper towel then get some baking soda and put it on the paper towel and roll it up like a sausage. Next get a piece of string, tie each end of the sausage. Afterwards get a coke bottle and pour 150mls of vinegar into the bottle. Next put one end of the baking soda sausage into the bottle and hold the string, put the other end in holding half of the string out. Put a corkscrew on, don't force it, twist it. Use a flat cone and put the cone in an ice cream container. Shake the bottle hard eight times then put it upside down on the launcher and wait till bubbles form. The baking soda and the vinegar makes the gas. Then pop! It's gone, try and catch it.
